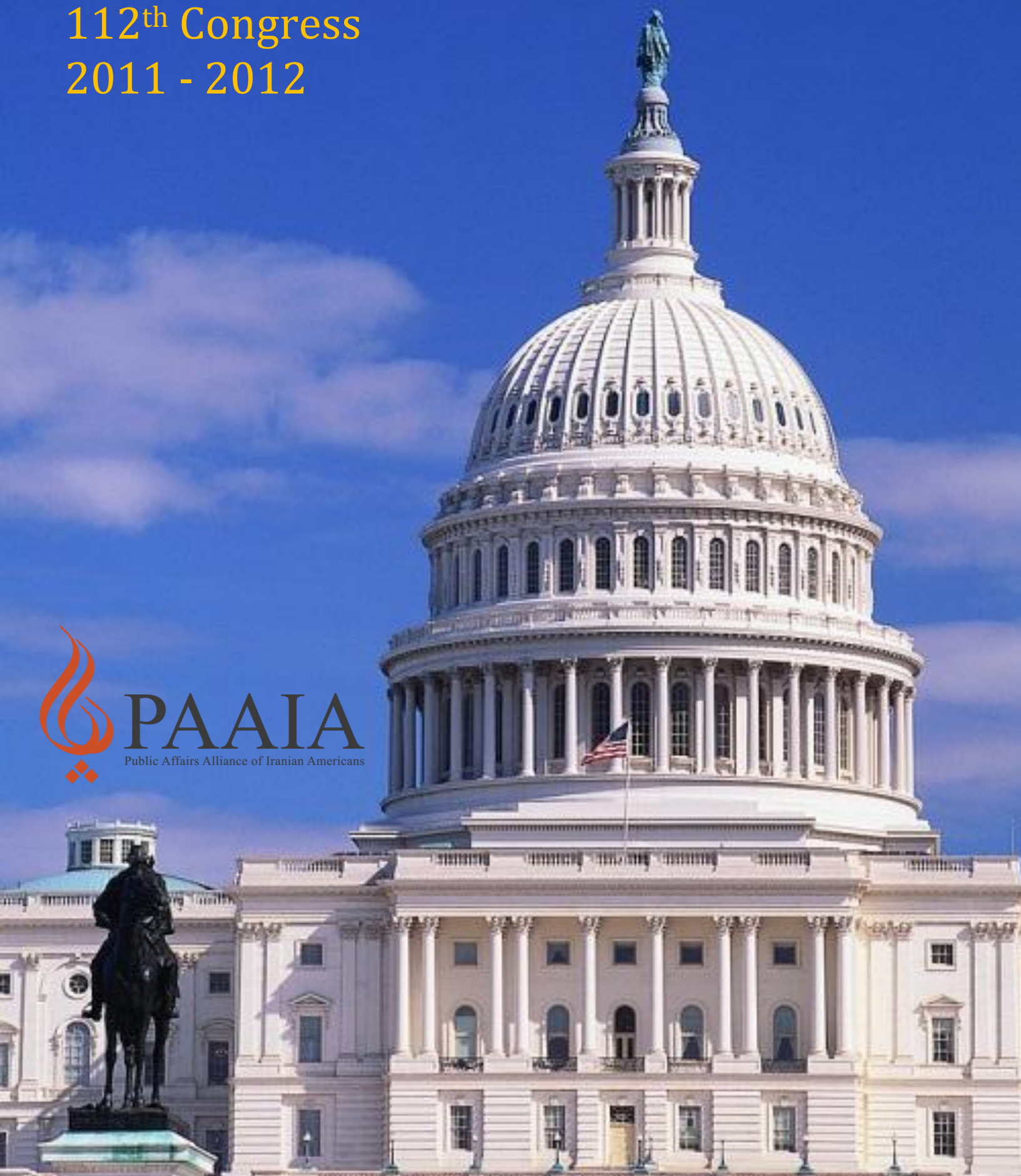


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ABOUT PAAIA

The Public Affairs Alliance of Iranian Americans (PAAIA) is a nonprofit, bipartisan, nonsectarian organization that represents the interests of the Iranian American community before U.S. policymakers, opinion makers, and the American public at large. We work to expand opportunities for the active participation of Iranian Americans in the democratic process at all levels of government and in public debate, and strive to foster greater understanding of our community and its Persian heritage.

One of PAAIA's principal missions is to advocate and advance policies and legislation at the local, state, and national levels on matters of interest or concern to Iranian Americans and in furtherance of the best interests of our community. To that end, PAAIA's Public Policy Center aims to

- educate the Iranian American community about the laws, regulations, and policies that affect their lives, and
- educate policymakers, lawmakers, and the general public about the views of Iranian Americans on important policy issues.

THE CONGRESSIONAL SCORECARD

The PAAIA 2011-2012 Congressional Scorecard rates members of Congress on votes and other positions taken in the House of Representatives and the Senate in the 112th Congress that affect and are of interest to the Iranian American community.

The primary purpose of the scorecard is to ensure that Iranian Americans are informed of the voting records and performances of their members of Congress. In addition, the scorecard ensures that members of Congress are aware that their votes and positions on issues of importance to the Iranian American community will be analyzed and made public. It examines votes and positions only for 2011 – 2012, and does not, in any way, reflect each member's voting record in the past. The scorecard is merely an informational tool used by PAAIA and its affiliated organizations and does not indicate our approval or disapproval of specific members of Congress.

In the scorecard, PAAIA focuses primarily on bills and congressional actions regarding civil liberties and immigration. We have included a "special category" which features noteworthy legislation that does not fall neatly into any particular topic.

The analysis in the next section divides reviewed legislation into the above categories. The analysis also states whether PAAIA supports (+) or opposes (-) each measure. The designation "S" refers to a bill in the Senate, while "H.R." refers to legislation introduced into the House of Representatives.



It should be noted that PAAIA is primarily focused on domestic U.S. affairs as they relate to the Iranian American community and is not a platform for promoting foreign policy positions towards Iran, unless

- such a position specifically impacts the Iranian American community (e.g., humanitarian aid, unreasonable OFAC restrictions negatively affecting activities in the United States, etc.), or
- there is broad consensus from the community, reflected through tools such as PAAIA's surveys.

However, we also recognize that it is important that Iranian Americans be informed about legislative initiatives and the positions that their members of Congress are taking concerning U.S.-Iran relations. Accordingly, we have profiled a number of bills that were presented before the House and Senate concerning relations between Iran and the United States. We denote those senators and representatives who have introduced, cosponsored, or voted for the legislation with (x). This is in keeping with PAAIA's neutrality on the subject.

SENATE

IMMIGRATION

S. 952 - DREAM (Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors) Act of 2011

The DREAM Act would authorize the Secretary of Homeland Security (DHS) to cancel the removal of and adjust the status of an alien lawfully admitted for permanent residence on a conditional basis, who meets the following conditions:

- is an alien who entered the United States on or before his or her 15th birthday and has been present in the country for five years prior to the Act's enactment,
- is a person of "good moral character,"
- is not inadmissible under specified grounds of the Immigration and Nationality Act,
- has not participated in the persecution of any person on account of race, religion, nationality, membership in a particular social group, or political opinion,
- has not been convicted of certain offenses under federal or state law,
- has been admitted to an institution of higher education (IHE) in the United States or has earned a high school diploma or general education development certificate in the United States, and
- was age 35 or younger on the date of this Act's enactment.



S.952 currently has 35 cosponsors and has been referred to the Committee on the Judiciary. Cosponsors have received a (+) on our scorecard. The senator(s) who introduced the legislation are marked in red.

S. 3217 - Startup Act 2.0

This bill amends the Immigration and Nationality Act to allow the Secretary of DHS to adjust the status of up to 50,000 aliens to conditional permanent residence. These individuals must have earned a master's degree or a doctorate in science, technology, engineering, or mathematics (one of the "STEM" fields). The bill will allow such an individual to remain in the U.S. for up to one year after the expiration of their student visa if the alien is searching for STEM field employment, and indefinitely if the alien remains actively engaged in a STEM field. The bill removes a STEM alien's conditional status after five years, if the alien has maintained eligibility during the entire five-year period.

The bill also authorizes the Secretary to issue conditional immigrant visas to up to 75,000 qualified alien entrepreneurs. The conditional basis of the visas would be removed after four years of maintaining qualified entrepreneur status.

S.3217 currently has 5 cosponsors and has been referred to the Committee on Finance. Cosponsors have received a (+) on our scorecard. The senator(s) who introduced the legislation are marked in red.

CIVIL LIBERTIES

S.990 - Patriot Sunset Extension Act of 2011

This bill, passed by both the Senate and House and signed into law by President Obama, extended three provisions of the USA Patriot Act:

- the "roving wiretap" power, which allows federal authorities to listen in on conversations between foreign suspects, even when they change their locations or the phones they are using,
- the "library" provision, which (contrary to traditional legal notions of search and seizure) allows the government to obtain "any tangible thing" relevant to a terrorism investigation, even if the "thing" in question has not been demonstrated to pertain to terrorist activities or individuals suspected of being terrorists, and
- the so-called "lone wolf" provision, which gives the government the power to investigate foreigners with no known links to terrorist groups.

The approval of secret federal courts is necessary for any of these three provisions to be used. All three provisions are viewed as valuable tools by law enforcement agencies but must be periodically renewed by Congress because of concerns that they could be used to violate civil liberties. The legislation reauthorized these provisions without making any amendments to protect Americans' privacy rights.



S.990 passed in the Senate on May 26, 2011 by a margin of 72 – 23. Those who voted for the extension have received a (-) on our scorecard, while those who voted against it have received a (+). The senator(s) who introduced the legislation are marked in red.

S.1670 - End Racial Profiling Act of 2011

This bill prohibits law enforcement agencies and personnel from engaging in any type of racial profiling and grants the United States or an individual injured by racial profiling the right to obtain declaratory or injunctive relief. The bill also requires law enforcement agencies to maintain adequate policies and procedures to eliminate racial profiling, and to cease existing practices that permit racial profiling.

S.1670 currently has 16 cosponsors and is pending before the Committee on the Judiciary. Cosponsors have received a (+) on our scorecard. The senator(s) who introduced the legislation are marked in red.

FOREIGN POLICY

H.R. 1905 - Iran Threat Reduction and Syria Human Rights Act of 2012

Discussed in the House section of this article, this bill was agreed to in the Senate on August 1, 2012 by unanimous consent. Senators who voted for the measure have an (x) placed next to their names.

S.J.RES. 41

This resolution states that the U.S. and the governments of other “responsible” nations have a vital interest in preventing Iran from acquiring a “nuclear weapons capability” and urges continued diplomatic and economic pressure on Iran until the Iranian government suspends uranium enrichment-related and reprocessing activities, cooperates with the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), and is willing to implement a permanent agreement assuring that Iran’s nuclear program has completely peaceful aims.

The resolution also backs “the universal rights and democratic aspirations of the people of Iran,” and rejects any policy that would rely on containment as the only possible option for dealing with Iranian nuclear ambitions. The resolution ends with the statement: “Nothing in this resolution shall be construed as an authorization for the use of force or a declaration of war.”

S.J.Res.141 passed the Senate on September 22, 2012 by a vote of 90-1. Those who voted for S.J.Res.141 have received an (x) next to their name. The senator(s) who introduced the resolution are marked in red.



S. RES. 80

This resolution condemns the government of Iran for state-sponsored persecution of members of the Baha'i faith and for violating the International Covenants on Human Rights. It calls on the Iranian government to release seven specified imprisoned Baha'i leaders, as well as all people held in Iranian prisons for religious reasons. It also calls on the President of the United States and the Secretary of State to demand the release of these prisoners and condemn the Iranian government's human rights violations. The resolution urges the President and Secretary to use measures available under the Comprehensive Iran Sanctions, Accountability, and Divestment Act of 2010 and Executive Order 13553 to sanction Iranian government officials and others directly responsible for human rights violations in Iran.

S.Res.80 was agreed to in the Senate on March 29, 2012 by unanimous consent. Senators who agreed to the measure have an (x) placed next to their names. The senator(s) who introduced the resolution are marked in red.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

IMMIGRATION

H.R. 140 - Birthright Citizenship Act of 2011

This bill would amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to consider a person born in the United States "subject to the jurisdiction" of the U.S. for citizenship at birth purposes if the person is born in the United States of parents, one of whom is:

- a U.S. citizen or national
- a lawful permanent resident alien whose residence is in the United States, or
- an alien performing active service in the U.S. armed forces.

H.R.140 currently has 90 cosponsors and has been referred to the Committee on the Judiciary. Cosponsors may include members of Congress from U.S. territories; however, they are not included in the scorecard because they do not have the power to vote on legislation. Cosponsors have received a (-) on our scorecard. The representative(s) who introduced the legislation are marked in red.

H.R. 1842 - House version of the DREAM (Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors) Act of 2011

The act would authorize the Secretary of DHS to cancel the removal of and adjust the status of an alien lawfully admitted for permanent residence on a conditional basis. The criteria for this adjustment include:



- the alien who entered the United States on or before his or her 15th birthday and has been present in the country for five years prior to the Act's enactment,
- is a person of "good moral character,"
- is not inadmissible under specified grounds of the Immigration and Nationality Act,
- has been admitted to an institution of higher education (IHE) in the United States or has earned a high school diploma or general education development certificate in the United States, and
- was age 32 or younger on the date of this Act's enactment.

H.R.1842 currently has 115 cosponsors and has been referred to the Committee on the Judiciary. Cosponsors have received a (+) on our scorecard. Cosponsors may include members of Congress from U.S. territories; however, they are not included in the scorecard because they do not have the power to vote on legislation. The representative(s) who introduced the legislation are marked in red.

H.R. 5893 - Introduced in the Senate as S.3217 or the Startup Act 2.0 (discussed above)

This bill was introduced in the House by Congressman Michael Grimm (R-NY 13th) on June 6, 2012. H.R.5893 currently has 23 cosponsors and has been referred to the Committee on the Judiciary. Cosponsors have received a (+) on our scorecard. Cosponsors may include members of Congress from U.S. territories; however, they are not included in the scorecard because they do not have the power to vote on legislation. The representative(s) who introduced the legislation are marked in red.

CIVIL LIBERTIES

S.990

Discussed in the Senate section of this article, was passed in the House by a margin of 250-153. Representatives who voted for the extension have received a (-) on our scorecard, while those who voted against it will receive a (+).

FOREIGN POLICY

H.R. 1905 - The Iran Threat Reduction and Syria Human Rights Act of 2012

This bill was passed by both the Senate and House and signed into law by President Obama. It is based on the Iran Sanctions, Accountability and Human Rights Act of 2012 (S.2101), which the Senate passed with unanimous support in May of 2012 and subjects nearly all of Iran's energy, financial, and transportation sectors to U.S. sanctions. The act adds new activities to those previously declared sanctionable by the Iran Sanctions Act



of 1996 (as amended by the Comprehensive Iran Sanctions, Accountability, and Divestment Act of 2010).

The legislation, among other things, shuts off existing loopholes in the sanctions regime against Iran, and includes sanctions on anyone who aides Iran's petroleum, petrochemical, or natural gas sectors, including insurance and shipping sectors, and sanctions anyone who engages in uranium mining with Iran anywhere in the world. The bill also includes financial sanctions aimed at further restricting Iran's access to the international financial system and specifies sanctions targeting Iran's human rights violators, their enablers, and the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps.

H.R.1905 passed the House of Representatives on August 1, 2012 by a margin of 421-6. Those who voted for the measure have an (x) placed next to their names. The representative(s) who introduced the legislation are marked in red.

H.R. 4173 - Prevent Iran from Acquiring Nuclear Weapons and Stop War through Diplomacy Act

This bill directs the President to appoint a high level U.S. representative or special envoy to seek to ease tensions and normalize relations between the U.S. and Iran, lead U.S. diplomatic efforts regarding Iran, and act as liaison with U.S. and international intelligence agencies. H.R. 4173 also directs the Secretary of State to rescind the no contact policy with Iran, and establish an office in the State Department to support the work of the representative or special envoy. A similar version of H.R.4173 was offered as an amendment (Amdt. 161) to the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2013 on May 18, 2012 but failed by a vote of 77-344.

H.R.4173 currently has 35 cosponsors and has been referred to the Committee on Foreign Affairs. Cosponsors have received an (x) next to their names. Cosponsors may include members of Congress from U.S. territories; however, they are not included in the scorecard because they do not have the power to vote on legislation. The representative(s) who introduced the legislation are marked in red.

H.RES. 60

This resolution urges the Secretary of State to remove the People's Mojahedin Organization of Iran (PMOI/MEK) from the Department of State's list of foreign terrorist organizations, and to lift all restrictions imposed on the MEK and its members and affiliates.

H.RES.60 currently has 98 cosponsors and has been referred to the Committee on Foreign Affairs. Cosponsors have received an (X) next to their names. Cosponsors may include members of Congress from U.S. territories; however, they are not included in the scorecard because they do not have the power to vote on legislation. The representative(s) who introduced the legislation are marked in red.



H.RES.568

This resolution states that the U.S. and the governments of other “responsible” nations have a vital interest in preventing Iran from acquiring a “nuclear weapons capability,” and urges continued diplomatic and economic pressure on Iran until the Iranian government suspends uranium enrichment-related and reprocessing activities, cooperates with the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), and is willing to implement a permanent agreement assuring that Iran’s nuclear program has completely peaceful aims. The resolution also backs “the universal rights and democratic aspirations of the Iranian people,” and rejects any policy that would rely on containment as the only possible option for dealing with Iranian nuclear ambitions.

The resolution was passed by the House on May 17, 2012 by a vote of 401-11. Those who voted for H.RES.568 have an (x) placed next to their names. The representative(s) who introduced the legislation are marked in red.

SPECIAL CATEGORY

H. CON. RES. 63

This congressional resolution supports the use of a bipartisan Presidential Commission to study the establishment of a National Museum of the American People that will tell the immigration and migration stories of all people in the US. The Presidential Commission will be a bipartisan, diverse body of distinguished Americans that will be responsible for developing and presenting a report to the President and Congress about the feasibility of establishing the museum. The money to fund the commission will come from non-appropriated funds.

H.CON.RES.63 currently has 38 cosponsors and has been referred to the Committee on Natural Resources. Cosponsors have received a (+) on our scorecard. Cosponsors may include members of Congress from U.S. territories; however, they are not included in the scorecard because they do not have the power to vote on legislation. The representative(s) who introduced the legislation are marked in red.
